- Highest Rates of Suicide
- Highest Rates of Homicide
- Binge Drinking and Drug Use
- Riskier Sexual Behavior
- Low Relationship Satisfaction
- Gun Violence
- Higher Rates of Physical Illness





Defining the Importance of Engaging Men and Boys in IPV/SV

- 8 out of 10 male OHMAN Questionnaire respondents believe that violence against women is a learned behavior that can be changed (Ortega, S. 2018)
- Only 4 out of 10 male OHMAN Questionnaire respondents felt confident that other men would listen to them if they confronted them about their sexist attitudes (Ortega, S. 2018)
- Unhealthy ideas about gender roles can be harmful to men, teach them not to speak out against their peers who degrade women, keep them from working to end SV / IPV, and silence them if they survive SV.
- Society teaches men that the worst thing one could be is like a woman, which continues to perpetuate hyper-masculinity and violence. (Maternal Sadism)

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Understanding **Special Barriers** that May Inhibit Men from Disclosing and Seeking Services After Experiencing IPV/SV

- Men DO NOT See Themselves Reflected in the Anti-Violence Movement as Survivors/Victims
- Men Who are Readily Open to Seek Services are Often More Detailed in Their Disclosures
- Myths about male survivors dominate our collective narrative over facts
- Disability, Language, Sexual Orientation, Gender identity, Black & People of Color face additional systemic barriers
- Men Fear Being Perceived as Weak, and/or Less Than When it Comes to DV, or Will I Be Believed.

How Does Power, Privilege, & Toxic Masculinity Lead to a Culture that Acts as a Catalyst to Violence

<u>Patriarchy</u> - A Sociopolitical System that Assumes that Men Should Have Power, Control and Dominion Over Others, Particularly Women and Children.

Patriarchy Requires a Rejection of Femininity to Function, This Rejection of the Feminine Becomes an Expected Behavior, Belief, & Attitude

Responses to Power Based Violence and Motivations to Act to Perpetuate Violence is Often Rooted in How We Understand Gender.

<u>Toxic Masculinity</u> – A Subset of Behaviors & Practices Typically Associated W/ Men That are Harmful &/or Destructive. These Behaviors Include Domination, Humiliation, Control, and Hyper Competitiveness & Connected to the Sexual Objectification of Women & Other Predatory Behaviors Like Aggression, Intimidation, and Violence.
