# What are Community Resource Groups?

Community Resource Groups (CRGs) are sessions provided at our conference for those with shared roles, identities or work experiences to be in community with one another. CRGs will be informal spaces to provide a sense of connection and support. These groups may engage in discussion, self-care, collective care, collective action and advocacy to promote change and address unique dynamics. The concept is flexible and can be applied to a wide range of contexts where people unite around shared interests or goals.

The role of the CRG Facilitator is to introduce the space, be a point person to welcome group members, set community agreements, guide the conversation, and ensure emotional safety of participants. Facilitators will have an OAESV staff member available for support as needed.

We welcome proposals that demonstrate the following characteristics:

- Supportive of the overall conference theme
- Addressing innovative or advanced concepts related to practice
- Inclusive of a variety of audiences, communities, and perspectives
- Promoting community collaboration and partnerships
- Reflective of the needs of adult learners (interactive workshop, hands-on activities, skills-based)

A note to potential presenters: We are committed to building a conference that highlights many perspectives and lived experiences. Potential presenters may come from a background less traditional to our field of work, and that's okay. We would strongly encourage you to apply.
